## **Bio: Ted Doolittle**

Ted Doolittle is a former federal prosecutor with a long career in health care and law enforcement, including a strong record in health- and fraud-related investigations and litigation, both criminal and civil, and with the private as well as public sectors. From January 2008 to 2011, Ted worked for United Healthcare's Legal and Regulatory Affairs Department, where he managed a wide variety of litigation against the company, in addition to conducting internal investigations of wrongdoing within the company. Previously, Ted served as an Assistant Attorney General in the Health Care Fraud and Whistleblower Department of the Connecticut Attorney General's Office, with a strong consumer protection focus. While serving with the Attorney General's Office, he conducted Medicaid provider fraud investigations and litigations, while also serving for over six years as the office's lead for all Enron-related litigation and investigations. Prior to his work with the Connecticut Attorney General's Office, Ted served as a Trial Attorney in the United States Department of Justice's Tax Division, where he handled and argued many federal appeals court matters throughout the nation, and prosecuted white collar fraud crimes in federal trial courts throughout the Southeastern U.S. While with DOJ, Ted also served as a Special Assistant United States Attorney for the District of Columbia, and before that, he clerked for federal trial and appellate court judges for several years. Ted graduated from the University of Connecticut School of Law, where he was Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of International Law, and is a graduate of Harvard, where he was captain of the men's crew team.
